Good Will Hunting

**a. Describe the psychotherapy setting portrayed in the selected movie or series.**

According to Balan (2024), Will's interactions with clinicians emphasize the significance of a therapeutic match, emphasizing the need for interpersonal alignment and a strong connection to the clinician for effective therapy. An emotional connection to the patient is necessary for successful psychotherapy (Wheeler, 2022).
